Homeowner Sewer Service Contract Announced

Harrison Mayor/Supervisor Richard Dionisio convened the Thursday, April 20th Board meeting, introducing Attorney Albert J. Pirro, Jr., Esq., Partner, Abrams Fensterman, LLP, representing

Pipelogix LMS, Inc.

"You may remember, a few months ago, the Town of Harrison entered into a contract with Pipelogix," Pirro began. "Essentially, Town authorized Westchester Joint Water Works (WJWW) to send notices to residents on sewer service that if they like, for \$14.95 a month on an annual basis, have their entire sewer lateral from their house out to the sewer main inspected, maintained and repaired at no cost to them.

"It is a Service Contract without any 'deducts.' If there is a problem, it

is totally repaired. In accordance with that arrangement the Town entered into, WJWW prepared a statement to go out to everybody. The \$14.95 fee would be on their water bill after May with opportunity to 'opt out."

Pirro then introduced Elliott Bloom, Pipelogix Vice President of Operations, who said that they immediately will send out notices to 1700 West Harrison homeowners, including form to opt out and extending the time period from May 15th to May 31st.

Then, to much acclaim, Dionisio announced that Comptroller/Treasurer Maureen MacKenzie received the 2023 Woman of Distinction Award. Acknowledging April Volunteer Appreciation Month,

> Dionisio also thanked Harrison Food Pantry volunteers. "Through your efforts, every Thursday we are able to provide food to residents in need. We thank you for your dedication and loyalty," Dionisio stated.

Next, a Public Hearing was opened Local Law 466-a of the Real Property Tax Law, pertaining to property owned by an enrolled member of an incorporated fire company, department or incorporated volunteer Mayor/Supervisor Richard Dionisio ambulance service or any such enrolled member and spouse residing

in any County having a population to 261,000 inhabitants but less than 270,000 inhabitants in accordance with the 1990 federal census, shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of 10% of the assessed value of such property.

However, such exemption shall not exceed \$3,000 multiplied by the latest state equalization rate.

The measure was approved by Roll Call Vote, carried over to the Village Board Agenda.

Pavement Improvement and Bridge Rehabilitation Project on I-95

Governor Kathy Hochul has announced the start of a \$61.8 million pavement improvement project on a four-mile stretch of the New England Thruway I-95 in the Bronx and Westchester County. The majority of the work will take place in the Bronx and includes the rehabilitation of 11 bridges and the replacement of the superstructures - concrete decks and steel beams - of two pedestrian bridges. Approximately 120,000 vehicles use this heavily traveled corridor each day.

"New York State is committed to rehabilitating aging infrastucture in communities that have gone over-

looked for far too long," Governor Hochul said. "This project will make critical safety improvements to I-95 in the Bronx and Westchester County and provide not only a safer driving experience for the millions of New Yorkers who drive on the highway every year, but also modernize the state's transportation infrastructure."

The I-95 project will begin with full-depth pavement repairs, meaning crews will remove and replace the most deteriorated portions on a four-mile stretch of roadway (milepost 0 to 4.0), down to its subbase in both the northbound and southbound direction. Covering more than 24 total lane miles, the repairs will improve the roadway's structural integrity. After the concrete pavement

is repaired, a two-course asphalt overlay will be installed to provide a smoother ride for motorists.

Paving operations and the majority of work will take place overnight to reduce impacts to motorists.


The other major component of the project is extensive bridge work. Crews will rehabilitate 10 vehicular bridges/ramps and one pedestrian bridge and remove and replace the superstructure on two pedestrian bridges over I-95 in the Bronx (one at 222nd Street and another at Dyre Avenue). Each bridge superstructure replacement will occur over

a 48-hour period on a weekend with free shuttle bus service provided during the closures. Those dates and further details will be announced at a later date.

In addition, safety improvements will include new guiderail, additional reflective line striping and upgrades to concrete barriers and curbs. All work is expected to be completed by the end of 2024.

Restani Construction Corp., of Queens, N.Y., is the project contractor following a competitive bidding process.

Thruway Authority Interim Executive Director Frank G. Hoare said, "Interstate 95 is a vital continued on page 4


This year, acclaimed author and poet Edwidge Danticat will receive an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree and award-winning producer, direc-

Harrison and North Castle police arrested

Westchester DA Cracks Down on Recent Robberies and Burglaries

Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah has announced a crackdown on burglaries and robberies across Westchester County

highlighting a string of felony charges for defendants arrested in connection with recent alleged break-ins and theft at homes and local businesses.

"Ensuring residents feel safe at home or when doing business in Westchester is an important priority for the DA's Office. The latest indictments and charges for recent incidents across Westchester should send a strong message that my Office and the 42 police departments we work with on a daily basis across this county remain committed to protecting Westchester residents and businesses," DA Rocah said.

The following case of interest note indictments and arraignments of defendants between January 1 to April 12 of 2023 charged with felonies connected to home or business burglaries and robberies:

four men, Oscar Dario Nino Franco, 42, Andres Felipe Albarracin Rodriguez, 34, and Jonathan Alejandro Cogua Osuna, 40, on March 10 and Javier Nino-Franco, 44, on March 28, for allegedly using force to enter a North Castle home and stealing

on March 10 and Javier Nino-Franco, 44, on March 28, for allegedly using force to enter a North Castle home and stealing approximately \$4,000 in coins. Franco, Rodriguez and Osuna were arraigned on March 10 and Nino-Franco on March 28 in North Castle Justice Court on the felony charge of Burglary in the Second Degree. Bail was set for all four defendants at \$100,000 cash/\$250,000 bond/\$500,000 partially-secured bond; after a review by a Westchester County Court judge the bail was increased for Nino-Franco to \$200,000

cash/\$500,000 bond/\$1 million partially-secured bond.

Charges against the defendants are merely accusations, and the defendants are presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

link for residents and commerce between New York City and New England, and rehabilitating this section will bring long-term improvements, improve community connections, and enhance the driving surface for the more than 40 million passenger and commercial vehicles who travel the corridor each year. This project is another example of strategically investing our toll revenue to meet the evolving needs of motorists and commerce across the tri-state region."

Assemblymember Amy Paulin said, "The I-95 pavement improvement project, which goes through my district in New Rochelle and Pelham and includes on and off ramps which badly need repair, is welcome news for the thousands of residents who rely on I-95 each day. I will continue

to advocate for state infrastructure improvement projects like this which help residents and support our economy."

Motorists may encounter lane closures on the New England Thruway along with traffic shifts and stoppages while construction is underway. Motorists should follow the posted work zone speed limits and are reminded that fines are doubled for speeding in a work zone. In accordance with the Work Zone Safety Act of 2005, convictions of two or more speeding violations in a work zone could result in the suspension of an individual's driver license.







Special Needs Trusts: A Different Perspective

If someone is the beneficiary of a Special Needs Trust {SNT}, the question is, 'Do I have to ask the trustee for everything? '

Let's start by pointing out that the trustee might be a bank or trust company, or perhaps, a relative or close associate. If the trustee is a corporate fiduciary, that could be intimidating for the beneficiary who might not feel comfortable making requests to the trustee. Alternatively, If the trustee is someone the beneficiary knows, then that might create additional tension for the beneficiary, who might not enjoy having to ask a relative for assistance. This is one of the reasons why we caution clients to think very carefully about who they select as trustee of an SNT. Sometimes, it is best to allow siblings to be siblings and not complicate things by appointing one of them as a trustee.

In either case, though, the beneficiary (or someone on behalf of the beneficiary, if the beneficiary does not have capacity) will need to make requests to the trustee. The trust is a separate legal entity, whose assets are managed and controlled by the trustee. If the beneficiary has concerns about asking for help, perhaps some expenses can be paid automatically each month. In any event, working closely with the trustee will make things easier for all. If that is not possible, perhaps a change in trustees is appropriate. The beneficiary might not have the authority to change trustees,

however; the SNT may contain other provisions which could give others the power to change trustees.

Sometimes, a good trustee is forced to say "no" to a beneficiary's request for a distribution. A variety of factors can go into that decision, including the amount of money in the trust, the language of the trust document, the life expectancy of the special needs beneficiary, the interests of the remainder beneficiaries, among many others. Being the trustee of an SNT is not an easy job. It is usually best for everyone if the trustee and the beneficiary can work things out amicably.

While there are many restrictions on what an SNT can pay for without jeopardizing the beneficiary's eligibility for means-tested government benefits, there are still many items that the trustee may pay for, including home internet connection, cell phone, travel and transportation, clothing, education, household furnishings, entertainment, and medical equipment and needs, just to name a few. However, it is very important that the trustee not make a cash distribution to the beneficiary since this could adversely affect the beneficiary's eligibility for some government benefits programs. Best to have the trustee pay for what the beneficiary wants directly to the provider of those benefits

If the onset of the beneficiary's disability oc-

curred before age 26 (scheduled to increase to age 46 in a couple of years), you might be eligible to set up an ABLE account. That can make a real difference for some beneficiaries. ABLE accounts, similar to an SNT, do not count as an asset for means-tested government benefits. Moreover, amounts in ABLE accounts can grow tax-free and distributions for qualified disability expenses are not taxable. Most importantly, the beneficiary does not have to ask a trustee for a distribution.

In closing, the relationship between the beneficiary and the trustee of an SNT can be complicated. However, if both parties work together, the arrangement can significantly improve the quality of life of the beneficiary.

"We are delighted to see such a strong interest in our academic programs, which are designed to prepare students for successful careers


and meaningful lives in a rapidly changing world," said Vice President for Enrollment and Marketing, Troy Cogburn.
