### **Board Authorizes Funding for Police** Training Courses and Fire Department **Equipment Purchases**

At the Board of Trustees meeting on February 15, Harrison Town/Village Supervisor/Mayor Richard Dionisio accepted the retirement of Detective Derka Abbate, effective February 27,

the cap on legal fees and related expenses was raised to \$175,000 in the matter of Willow Ridge Country Club Condemnation, and the appointment of Elizabeth Brown, Liaison between Town of Harrison and Fire District #2, was authorized.

The Board approved two requests by Police Chief John Vasta. The first was for two department members to attend Street Cop Training-Becoming the New York Traffic Law Expert on March 25 at the Putnam County Training and Op- Mayor Richard Dionisio erations Center in Carmel; the second was for one department

member to attend the 2024 Firearms Instructor Course given by the Rockland County Police

Academy Range in Haverstraw from April 12-26.


The Board also authorized Comptroller Maureen MacKenzie to purchase equipment for Fire District #2 from monies that were rolled into the district's fund balance at the end of 2023, Scott Air Packs for Municipal Emergen-

> cy Services, and Talos Security Systems for ID Card and Access System for Downtown Fire House.

Additionally, the Board granted permission to Doreen Grozinger from the Harrison Council for the Arts to use the Municipal Building for an art reception for the Harrison Central School District's students and on April 28 from 12:00 pm. to 4:00 p.m. for the reception of Art of the Young Child, an exhibit of art and photos of the Harrison Children's Center.

Finally, the Board granted Catherine Tammaro, Director of Community Services, permission to enter into a part-

ner agreement with Feeding Westchester.

#### NYC Man Sentenced to Seven Years for Illegal Gun Possession

Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah recently announced that a New York City man was sentenced to seven years in state prison for illegal gun possession.

DA Rocah said: "This sentence is another example of my unwavering commitment to removing dangerous weapons and those who illegally possess them from our streets."

The defendant, Jose Valle, 35, of New York City, pleaded guilty on October 12, 2023, to Criminal Possession of a Weapon in the Second Degree, a felony. In addition to his sentence, the defendant will receive five years of post-release supervision. The defendant, who has prior felony convictions, is prohibited from legally possessing firearms.

On December 28, 2022, at approximately 4:48 p.m., the Westchester County Department of Public Safety conducted a routine traffic stop on the Hutchinson River Parkway in Harrison. The defendant attempted to flee before police arrested him and recovered from the defendant's pant leg a 9mm pistol loaded with seven bullets.

The case was before Judge George Fufidio in Westchester County Court and prosecuted by Senior Assistant District Attorney Adrian Murphy of the Trials and Investigations Division.

### **Estate Planning for Retirement Accounts**

Estate planning requires a lot of thought and involves so much more than drafting and executing a few documents. One thing you need to ensure is that your overall estate plan is coordinated with your retirement and other accounts so that your beneficiary designations do not upset what you think is a perfectly drafted estate plan. For example, if your will leaves everything to your son and daughter equally, but your 401(k) plan at work lists your daughter as the beneficiary, then she will inherit all the money in the 401(k) notwithstanding what the will says. As a general rule, a specific beneficiary designation in an account, including a retirement account, will control where the funds go upon your demise, regardless of what your will says.

Moreover, retirement account beneficiary designations present additional challenges due to the fact that, for many clients, this is where the bulk of their wealth is, and retirement plan custodians often have their own set of internal rules and policies that must be complied with; many of which don't make sense or are frustrating to deal with. Thus, in many instances, it is difficult to figure out how to complete your retirement account beneficiary designation forms, especially if you have a living trust, would like to leave money to charity, or wish to minimize income taxes. We have heard multiple horror stories from clients about some institu-

tions requiring medallion guarantees for signatures (which can be difficult to obtain), and others not allowing online beneficiary designation changes, among many others. Therefore, it is best to get your retirement account affairs in order before you become incapacitated or pass away so that your beneficiaries don't get caught up in a morass of red tape, causing delay and confusion.

If you are married, naming your spouse as the beneficiary of your retirement plan is usu-

ally (but not always, especially in a second marriage situation), the best option. This is due to the fact that a surviving spouse can "rollover" your retirement account into his/her own retirement account which typically leads to the best tax results. If you are re-married and have children from a prior marriage, there may be better options available to you that would involve the use of a trust to ensure that your children inherit the portion of your retirement account that you intend for them to have. However, this area of the law is fraught with traps for the unwary so please make sure you proceed with a competent estate planning attorney.

If you have charitable intentions, leaving



money to a charity from a retirement account is often an excellent choice since the charity will not have to pay income taxes on the distributions from the retirement account after your death. Whereas, if you name an individual as the beneficiary of your retirement account, he/ she will have to pay income taxes on the distributions. Thus, if you leave your \$100,000 retirement account to your daughter, depending on her own personal tax situation, she may have to pay \$35,000 in taxes and would

net only \$65,000 from your retirement account. If you left the \$100,000 retirement account to a charity, the charity would net the entire \$100,000, a much better result. You could leave your daughter \$100,000 from a non-retirement account and she would receive the entire \$100,000 since income taxes would not be owed on a non-retirement bequest.

The recently enacted SECURE Act made significant changes to retirement plan distributions, including eliminating the stretch IRA, except in the case of eligible designated beneficiaries (EDB). An EDB is a spouse, a disabled or chronically ill individual, an individual who is not more than 10 years younger than you, or a

minor child. For EDBs, the stretch IRA still lives and can result in significant financial and tax benefits to your family if all the relevant criteria are met. However, please note that the rules are complicated, especially if you want to leave your retirement accounts to a trust. A trust could be a good idea if you are concerned about protecting retirement assets from the cost of long-term care for a disabled or chronically ill beneficiary.

Retirement account beneficiary designations can be challenging, and it is important that they be coordinated with the overall estate plan. When updating your estate plan, do not forget to include a review of all your beneficiary designations, including retirement plans.

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#### New Law Requires Merchants to Provide Clear Disclosure of Credit Card Surcharges to Consumers

Westchester County Executive George Latimer, New York State Assemblywoman Amy Paulin, and County Director of Consumer Protection Jim Maisano are working together to ensure that residents are well-informed about a new law aimed at promoting transparency in credit card transactions. This new state law, which went into effect on February 11, 2024, mandates that merchants in New York State must provide clear and conspicuous disclosure of credit card surcharges to consumers.

Latimer said, "Transparent pricing is essential for consumers

to make informed decisions. This new law will empower Westchester residents by ensuring they have clear visibility into any credit card surcharges they may incur, and I thank my colleague in government Assemblywoman Paulin for her efforts on its passage and Governor Hochul for signing it into law."

Paulin added, "This new law protects New Yorkers from hidden surcharges by requiring sellers to clearly post the price of a credit card surcharge. Credit card surcharges now have to be disclosed clearly so that customers are fully aware of them upfront and not just when they go to pay. The new law also prevents businesses from charging a higher fee than what they are charged by the credit card companies. This legislation is ultimately about transparency, fairness, and preventing consumers from being misled when making purchases using credit cards. I thank Jim Maisano, Director of the Westchester County Department of Consumer Protection, for bringing this important issue to my attention. His idea is now a law which will protect

The new law limits credit card surcharges to the amount charged to the business by the credit card company and requires businesses to clearly display the total price inclusive of any surcharges before checkout. It aims to prevent consumers from being surprised by hidden fees and ensures that they have a clear understanding of the costs associated with credit card transactions.

Maisano said, "This law reinforces the principles of fairness and transparency in commercial transactions. We are committed to ensuring that consumers are protected from deceptive practices, and this legislation is a significant step forward in achieving that goal."

In anticipation of the summer production, the Artistree Community Theater invites the Sound Shore to mark their calendars for Guys and Dolls auditions on May 7 and 8.



### Purchase College Professor Awarded Major Grant by New York State's Department of Environmental Conservation

Purchase College, SUNY, has announced that Dr. Allyson Jackson, Associate Professor of Environmental Studies, has been awarded a major grant of \$99,480 by New York State's Department of Environmental Conservation to support invasive species prevention.

The Purchase College grant is one of 43 projects awarded a total of \$3 million to reduce the negative impacts of invasive species on New York State's natural resources, economy, and communities. These grants are part of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation's Invasive Species Grant Program, which provides funding for aquatic and terrestrial invasive species spread prevention, early detection and rapid response, lake management planning, research, and education and outreach.

The Purchase College grant will provide 3 years of funding to help combat invasive species in

the Blind Brook Forest on the eastern side of the campus. Parts of this forest are at least 100 years old, and it has a diverse community of plants and animals

Due to the construction of Broadview, the new senior living community on campus, part of the forest had to be cut down to connect to the sewer line, leaving a corridor that allows invasive species to move into the forest. As invasive species can take over a forest and kill many of the trees without management, this grant will provide funding to actively remove invasive species from that area and replant native trees and shrubs.

Dr. Jackson said, "The majority of this funding is going toward hiring full-time student technicians in the summer and paid student internships during the academic year for the next 3 years. I'm really excited to be able to provide ed-

ucational hands-on work experiences for our students, while also taking care of the forest that we all love so deeply. With our help, the forest will be able to recover and regrow and we will be able to help protect this environment for years to come."

Dr. Ryan Taylor, Chair of the Environmental Studies Department, said, "The entire Environmental Studies department is eager to start implementing this restoration project. Our students come to college wanting to change the world for the better, and thanks to Dr. Jackson's visionary efforts and this generous grant, they have a tangible way they can make a significant impact."

Dr. Rudolf Gaudio, Director of the School of Natural and Social Sciences at Purchase said, "This award recognizes Dr. Jackson's commitment to scientific research and teaching that serves the needs of our campus, our community, and our planet. Environmental Studies thrives at Pur-

chase College!"

Purchase College President Dr. Milagros (Milly) Peña said, "I congratulate Dr. Jackson on this prestigious grant and on her dedication to inspiring the next generation of environmental scientists and stewards of the environment. I believe this work will have a profound impact on our students and on our community."

The grants are supported by the State's Environmental Protection Fund (EPF). The EPF is a critical resource for environmental programs such as land acquisition, farmland protection, invasive species prevention and eradication, recreation access, water quality improvement, and environmental justice projects.

# Latimer Highlights Success of CDBG Program



When County Executive George Latimer first took office in 2018, the Westchester Urban County Consortium was defunct. Westchester County's municipalities were not eligible to apply for Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) due to non-compliance with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Fair and Affordable Housing Settlement of 2010.

One of Latimer's top priorities was to reestablish the Urban County Consortium, and the ability for municipalities, primarily towns and villages, to apply for CDBG grants. The County had been missing out on millions of potential dollars in CDBG funding each year that could be used for infrastructure improvements, and community development projects. Since Latimer re-established the CDBG program in 2019, more than \$41 million in CDBG funds has been awarded across Westchester County.

To re-establish the Consortium, Latimer convened a meeting of the eligible municipalities with regional HUD representatives. The County, through the Planning Department, then worked directly with each municipality to advise them on the benefits, responsibilities, and application process for the program.

Latimer said: "Because of the previous administration's non-compliance with a legal settlement, Westchester County's communities were forced to miss out on millions of dollars in much-needed funding from this federal program. The year 2019 was the first year these grants had been received in Westchester since 2010, and I am proud to report that since that time, over \$41 million in funding has been awarded to our participating municipalities for projects like sidewalk repairs, park improvements, handicapped accessible vans, senior center programs and more. I know our local communities truly see the value in this program, which has had the power to make a real difference across Westchester County."

Since 2019, Westchester County has been eligi-

ble to apply for three grant programs:

- · Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) which provides funds to local municipalities and nonprofits for physical facilities and public services;
- $\cdot \quad \mbox{HOME Program which provides funds to} \\ \mbox{developers of affordable housing; and}$
- · Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) which provides funds to non-profits for homeless eviction programs.

The funding totals below are broken down by calendar year:

- 2019 \$4,425,256
- 2020 \$4,666,010 (annual allocation) \$10,845,298.33 (CDBG and ESG Covid-related funds)



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
